

The "E" stamp is probably similar in function to HMV's other filler stamps, such as its Tudor Rose design, which were used when the correct stamp could not be affixed for some reason. This record is a re-labelled UK-pressed HMV from 1937.



EUPA

Germany

The initials EUPA were registered as a trademark in April 1913 for Eugen Pape Nfl. [Nachfolger=successor] at Hamburg. The company was founded in 1832, and still existed in 1929. Before WWI they were dealers in phonographs and discs. They had their own label in various designs, but always connected with Beka, as demonstrated by the second label.





FAVORITE

Germany

Favorite originated in Germany, with exports to the UK beginning in 1906. During WW1 they were pressed at the Mead Works in Hertfordshire, continuing until 1920.


KAREL HAŠLER






